Time

"So teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom."

(Psalm 90:12)

"Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise but as wise, making the best use of the time, because the days are evil."

(Ephesians 5:15-16)

Talent

It includes our abilities, personalities, passions, knowledge, experiences, relationships, spiritual gifts...

Treasure

It includes our money, possessions, family, friends, church, small group, colleagues...

Treasure - Money

Scripture relates money to the love of God:

"If someone has enough money to live well and sees a brother or sister in need but shows no compassion—how can God's love be in that person?"

(1 John 3:17)

Treasure - Money

Money is a good servant but a bad master.

"No servant can serve two masters, for either he will hate the one and love the other, or he will be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and money."

(Luke 16:13)

Treasure - Money

"Either we serve God and use money or we serve money and use God. Yet, few Christians deliberately dedicate their lives to materialism. Wealth is deceitful, Jesus told us, and its bondage is subtle."

We come into the world with nothing and leave it with nothing.

God warns us against this attitude:

Tithing

- Giving God a tenth of our income proves that we believe it.
- The issue is not how much we give but how much we keep.

"You shall not covet..."

(Exodus 20:17)

"Take care, and be on your guard against all covetousness, for one's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions."

(Luke 12:15)

"Keep your life free from love of money, and be content with what you have..." (Hebrews 13:5)

- The opposite of covetousness is contentment.
- Covetousness: wanting things so much that your lose your contentment in God.

The way to win the fight against covetousness is to give.

"The principle of the consumer age is: if you have it, spend it. The discipleship principle is: if you have it, it is a gift from God, a gift to enjoy, but the only way you will truly enjoy the gift is to give it back."

(Peter Maiden, Discipleship)

"When we give money, we are releasing a little more of our egocentric selves and a little more of our false security... Giving frees us to care..."

God gives us more than we need

Difference between grabbers and givers:

"If you cling to your life, you will lose it, and if you let your life go, you will save it." (Luke 17:33)

God gives to us according to the measure that we give – the more we give, the more we receive from God.

"Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap. For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you." (Luke 6:38)

Be faithful to what God has entrusted to us

Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30)

- The rewards were not based on how much they were given, but on what they did with what they were given.
- Do not compare.
- Be faithful.
